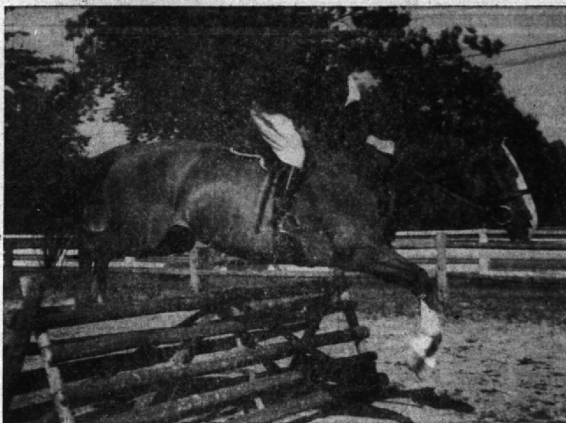


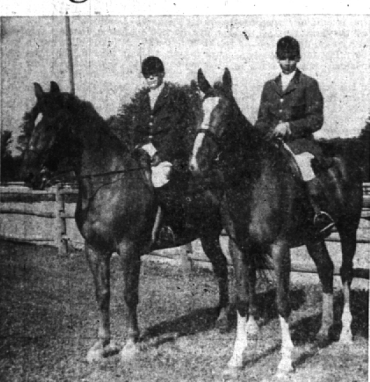
Harney, Harney To Golf Field For Western Open at Plum Hollow

Artistic horsemanship is an ancient and honorable sport that originated in Greece many centuries before the birth of Christ. The Grecian Olympic games provide the first record of horse racing and equestrian sports of major contests—dating back at least as far as 680 B.C.

In 440 B.C. Phidias executed the famous Parthenon frieze, displaying more than 200 horses and riders in a magnificent, lively procession.

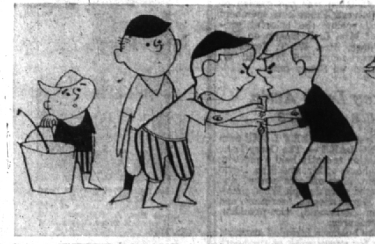
