Safety Council Cites City's Traffic Record

Birmingham has been cited by the National Safety Council for its 1956 traffic safety record. The city has been awarded a Certificate of Achievement for "no traffic deaths and noteworthy performance in traffic safety activities, and maintenance of accident records."

The announcement was made in a letter last week to City Manager Harold K. Schone from Safety Council Executive Vice President G. C. Stewart. The city received a Certificate of Achievement in 1955 which cited it for maintenance of accident records. Questioned on the city's accident records, Birmingham Police Chief Ralph W. Moxley said Birmingham police prepared 648 accident reports in 1956. They covered 91 personal injury accidents and 557 property damage cases, with no fatalities.

Youth Pinned Under Convertible In Accident

Birmingham area traffic reports over the long weekend listed one accident in which a 23-year-old youth was pinned under an overturned convertible, and two other injury accidents. Birmingham police at first feared a fatality when they were called to the scene of the accident on Adams near Woodward in which Kenneth L. Bone, 23, of Berkeley, struck a telephone pole and overturned his 1956 convertible at 2 a.m. Friday. Patrolman Howard Hatt had an ambulance stand by while a wrecker from a service station made an unsuccessful attempt to right the car so the injured man could be removed. A second wrecker had to be called before Bone could be freed.

HE WAS RUSHED to William Beaumont hospital, where he was treated for multiple lacerations of arm and scalp and fracture of the right femur. Reconstructing the accident from skid marks on the pavement, police said Bone lost control of the car as he attempted to turn right onto Adams from Woodward. His car first struck a guy wire, and a no parking sign, and left marks as it skidded on the pavement.

Only slight injuries were suffered by the two drivers whose cars collided at Maple and Adams Saturday evening. Lloyd C. Boye, 18, of Clawson, and Stephen E. Surridge, 16, of 988 N. Glenhurst, Birmingham, told police they would see their private physician for treatment.

Only one serious accident marred the four-day holiday record of the Bloomfield township police. Four persons were injured in a three-car accident at 12:35 a.m. Monday at Woodward avenue and Quarten road. According to police, William J. Guay, 999 W. Harsdale, Bloomfield Hills, traveling west on Big Beaver

road, failed to stop at the stop sign at Woodward avenue. Witnesses reported he started to turn right, straightened out and ran across the grass strip into the southbound traffic. He first hit a car driven by Eugene J. Croteau, 2324 Harris, Ferndale. Guay's car then skidded and hit the right front of a car driven by Frank N. Mainelli, 132 LaBelle, Highland Park. Guay, 29, was treated and held at Beaumont hospital, Royal Oak for lacerations of the face. Also treated for fractures and lacerations of the hand and arm were Croteau, 45, and Nora Croteau, 41. A second passenger, Jean Marie English, 3 years old, was released after being treated for facial abrasions and a fractured right shoulder.
