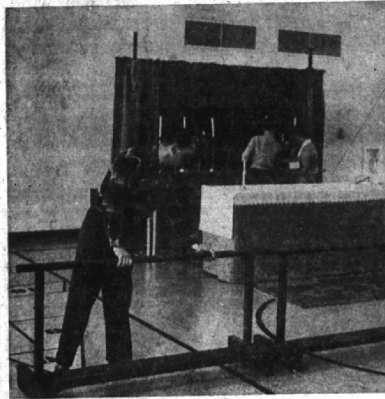

## Eastover School Serves as Church on Sundays

As rural areas become suburban, and then urban areas, new churches or branches of churches come in to fill the needs of residents transplanted in the area.

But in most cases these churches must hold services in

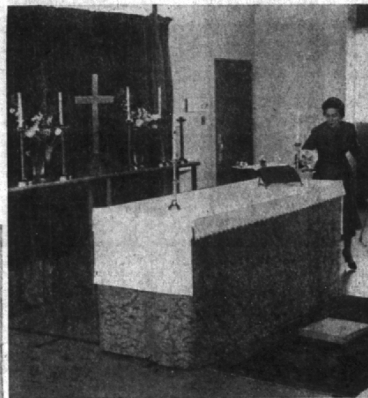
schools, homes, other churches or wherever they can find room enough for their congregation to assemble. One of these 'pioneers' in the Birmingham area is a branch of Christ Church Cranbrook, North Adams Episcopal Mission, which temporarily is using Eastover school off North Adams road for services.

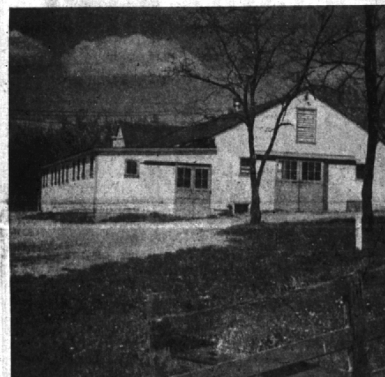
Dorthea Zaber, 2700 Squirrel road, gets the chalice ready before services start. Church materials are stored in a truck between services.



Once the church is set and services begin there is little to distinguish the Mission from any regularly appointed church.

This stable on North Adams, north of Long Lake road, is on 15 acres purchased by Christ church as a site for the new Mission's permanent home. Meanwhile, services will continue at Eastover.

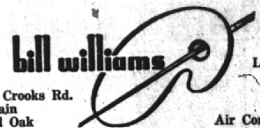
