Leslie Field, Detroit attorney and authority on civil liberties, will be the speaker at the general meeting of the League of Women Voters of Birmingham, Monday, March 18, at 1 p.m. at the Birmingham Community Center. He will talk on the "Federal Loyalty-Security program." A graduate of the University of Michigan law school, Mr. Field is chairman of the Constitutional Practice of Law committee of the State Bar of Michigan. He serves as chairman of the Due Process committee and board member of the Metropolitan Detroit Branch of the American Civil Liberties Union. In 1948 he was vice president of the International Society for General Semantics.
