**NOTICE OF SPECIAL TOWNSHIP ELECTION, TO BE HELD IN THE TOWNSHIP OF SOUTHFIELD, OAKLAND COUNTY, MICHIGAN, ON MONDAY THE 1st DAY OF APRIL, 1957.**

TO THE QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE TOWNSHIP OF SOUTHFIELD:

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT a Special Election will be held in the Township of Southfield, in the County of Oakland, and State of Michigan on Monday the 1st day of April, 1957.

YOU ARE FURTHER NOTIFIED that the polls for said election shall be open from 7:00 o'clock in the forenoon to 8:00 o'clock in the evening, Eastern Standard Time, on the day of said Special Election.

The purpose of said Special Election is to vote upon the following proposition:

Shall the tax limitation increase of \$200 per \$1,000 of equalized valuation, voted by the electors of the Township of Southfield, Oakland County, Michigan, on April 4, 1956, and amended as to purpose by said electors on February 20, 1956, be terminated as of April 1, 1957,

and in lieu thereof shall the limitation on the total amount of taxes which may be assessed each year against property in said township for all purposes (except taxes levied for the payment of interest and principal on obligations incurred prior to December 8, 1952), be increased as provided in Section 21 of Article X of the Constitution of Michigan, for a period of twenty (20) years from 1957 to 1976, both inclusive, by 2/10th of 1% (2/100 of \$1,000) of the assessed valuation as equalized, for the purpose of paying the Township's obligations on any contracts, special assessments or bond issues pertaining to drains or trunk sewers (or any rights therein), with power to the Township Board to irrevocably allocate said tax limitation increase provided that no more than 50% thereof shall be pledged to such obligation or obligations relating to any one project?
