That the form and sufficiency of the petition heretofore filed on December 18, 1956, praying for a New Charter Commission for the City to be known as "Southfield" to consist of the territory described in said petition, complies with the provisions of the Act, being Act 279 of the Public Acts of 1956, as amended, and are in all respects regular;

That April 1, 1957 be set as the date for a Special Election for a New Charter Commission for the City of Southfield.
