From now until late fall your lawn may be on your mind or in your hair or it may first look like the dickens. It should be none of these! It can be a very pleasant afea to lie on, to play on, to lie about or just to look at. It will hold down the temperature in your yard several degrees. It will require some work, some money and a willingness to consider seriously the following fundamentals of LAWN MAINTENANCE and IMPROVEMENT.

Assume that we are concerned with a typical lawn comprised primarily of just the deep rooted Kentucky blue grass or blue grass mixed with Fescue.

FOUR PRIMARY ACTIONS

- 1. Fertilization
 2. Mowing
 3. Watering
- 4. Re-seeding

1. Current studies indicate that grass plants require 6 to 7 lbs, of NITRGEN per 1,000 sq. ft. per year. This is obtained by distributing 20 lbs. of 10 sq. ft. per year. This is obtained by distributing 20 lbs. to 100 sq. ft, at least three times during the year.—now, in June and again in September. Note:—If you select a fertilizer with a lower NITRGEN content, say 5-10-5, then you should use twice as much. The result is you have to handle twice as much weight, paid more and put on too much phosphate and potash. Incidentally, a well-fed lawn stretches a limited supply of water amazingly.

Mowing seems to be geared to the lawn owners taste and they don't all taste alike. Some like it long, some like it short, some leave the clippings, some remove the clippings.

Things to be remembered about grass are:—
A. The taller it is the more shade it provides for young grass seedlings (of course beyond 2 or 2½ inches it might begin to look like a meadow) 2 inches is the best height.

B. It keeps the ground cool and moist which is ideal for helping seedlings and growing stronger roots.

C. It keeps the sun off the weed seeds thus retarding and even preventing their germination.

D. The clippings if less than one inch long will work down and help in shading and holding moisture. They also provide a fine seed hed for new seeds and return nourishment to the soil.

ment to the soil.

E. Grass is peculiar in that it grows from the bottom and not the tips. Cutting off the tips which may be faded restores the fresh bright color. It has been said that a bald man has his hair trimmed just as often as a guy with a real mop. The time required to cut the hair or lawn depends not on the amount cut off but on the area to be covered by the cutter.

3. Watering should be deep (6 to 8 inches) and infrequent (once a week, except perhaps in drought periods when every 4th or 5th day might be required. Deep watering encourages deep rooted grasses—such as we are talking about. Shallow, frequent watering encourages shallow rooted plants such as bent grass, chickweed, crabgrass, quack grass, etc.

Test your sprinklers by setting out 2 or 3 one-pound coffee cans. For average soils, when there is one inch of water in the can, you have done the

Re-seeding is for replacing grass plants which have been lost by death, eaten, pulled out by chil-dren, lawn mowers, rakes, etc.

It should be done carefully with special attention being given to thin areas, bare areas, etc.

It should be done in the spring or fall when temperatures are lower as these are the periods when the seeds germinate quicker and produce more stalks.

The rate of re-seeding most generally recommended is:—

idea is:—
Bare ground—1 pound to 200 sq. ft.
Fair lawn—1 pound to 400 sq. ft.
Thick turf—1 pound to 500 to 600 sq. ft.

Let us now be informal and drop a few odds and ds such as:—

Hard raking now will remove the well-rotted protective cover of dead clippings as well as thousands of struggling plants. This is bad! Once over LIGHTLY with broom rake is the better procedure.

Burning the grass with a good 10-6-4 fertilizer is bad! But is isn't necessary! After the grass be-gins to grow a little care is required. After apply-ing a couple of spreader loads hose the fertilizer off the blades.

We loan spreaders to those who buy fertilizer from us. But, heavens! at least a hundred people bought fertilizer Friday and Saturday and YoU KNOW we don't have a hundred spreaders to loan. RESERVE YOURS well in advance or, better yet ... OWN A LAWN BEAUTY!

DO NOT ROLL the lawn while the soil is DO NOT ROLL the lawn while the soil is wet. It will simply, compact the surface so the much needed air cannot get to the roots. Remember this: Rolling is simply to press the grass plants back in place after the heaving from alternate thawing and freezing; it will not change the contour of your lawn.

DON'T FALL for the black muck racket. Baled PEAT MOSS is better and cheaper for top dressing if a dressing is needed. If you don't believe us ask some who have fallen for black muck or peat humus racket.
