Gillespie Dies On Business Trip

Funeral services for Richard H. Gillespie, 47, of 500 Filbert, Birmingham, were conducted Monday at Bell chapel, W. R. Hamilton Co. Gillespie, truck fleet sales manager for GMC Truck and Coach division of General Motors Corp., Pontiac, died of heart attack Feb. 28, while on a business trip in New York city.

Born May 15, 1909, in Berkeley, Calif., he attended St. Mary's college at Moraga, Calif., and the University of California at Berkeley. He served as an advertising manager for McManus, John and Adams and also worked for Kaiser-Frazer Corp., prior to joining GM in 1937.

Gillespie held positions as zone manager and regional sales manager and also worked in sales promotion for GM. In July, 1956, he was appointed to the post held at the time of his death.

Surviving are his wife, Audrey, and a son, Richard, Jr., 15. Burial was in White Chapel cemetery.
