Lee Olive plans to continue college studies towards a bachelor of science degree.

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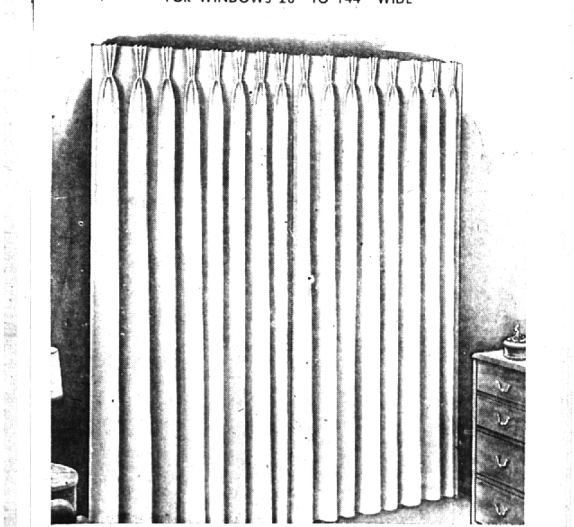
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She is the representative of the Student Nurses Association and chairman of the program committee for this area. After a week's vacation at home, she will return to the hospital for her three years of training.

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
