When a reader puts expression into reading aloud, his listeners enjoy it more. That's why Sister Mary Helen, teaching principal at Our Lady Queen of Martyrs school decided to stage a campaign against boredom, jerky sentences. Her campaign weapon was a contest staged last week to encourage good reading. Her campaign managers were five mothers of students. In the parents-and-children cooperative effort, one student from each classroom was adjudged a reading champion and presented with a prize.

MRS. THOMAS RALEIGH was program chairman. Other mothers who helped with the program by serving as judges were Mrs. Russell Montgomery, Mrs. John Fralick, Mrs. John Crosby, and Mrs. John Harris.

Children were permitted to select any lines from their school reading material for their entries. In classroom eliminations, both students and teachers selected their best reader candidates. Children thus became reading critics, learned an awareness of factors necessary for good reading and speaking.

IN A FULL afternoon of judging, the five mothers heard classroom finalists read aloud. Computing scores on the basis of 100 per cent for each unit of content, mothers gave percentage ratings on type of selection chosen, pronunciation, enunciation, expression, pace and fluency. Mothers noted that first and second graders were high scorers in expression.
