Other candidates to be elected are John H. Longley, seeking election for one year term on the council.

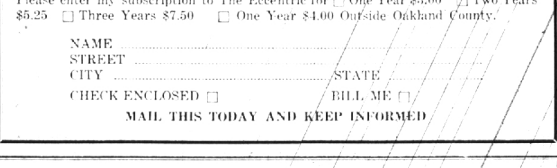
