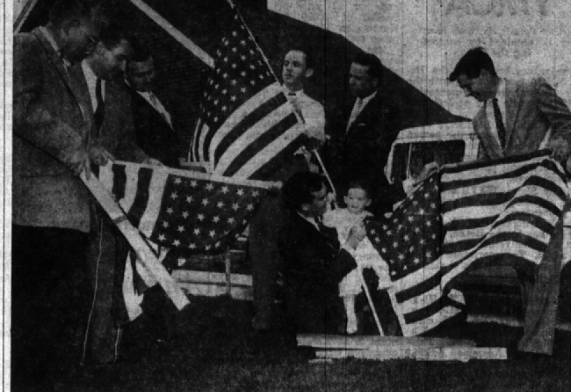

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Bloomfield Hills Public Safety Director Named

Post of a director of public safety to have jurisdiction over both the police and fire departments was created by the Bloomfield Hills city commission Tuesday night.

Robert J. Stadler, city clerk-treasurer, was asked to serve in the new capacity temporarily until the commission had time to study the situation and appoint a permanent director. The commission indicated that it would do so in the near future, probably within a month.

Commissioner Dominic Vetrino in recommending the creation of the joint post stressed that both departments would operate as separate units, at present.

RETIREMENT of Police Chief Stanley Kevera effective May 15 precipitated the commission's action. Mayor John S. Bugas reported the creation of such an overall post was the recommendation of two officers from the Michigan state police who inspected the city's operating system and facilities last week at the commission's request.

James S. Beresford lauded Kevera's three years of service as chief, saying that he had enhanced the department's reputation during his term. He urged the commission to study the department in terms of "broadening its functions in a growing community before appointing a permanent successor."

John D. Howarth, of Lakeview court, questioned whether the commission was going to overlook the long service of Lt. Walter Shuter, who was well as outsiders qualified for the post. He stressed that the commissioners would not act hastily.

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Henry Woolfenden Is Appointed to Hills Commission

Henry L. Woolfenden was appointed by unanimous vote of the Bloomfield Hills city commission Tuesday night to fill the unexpired term of C. G. Eden, who died April 20.

Woolfenden, who lives on Kensington road in Bloomfield Hills, was notified of his appointment by telephone. He immediately came over to the city offices to attend the rest of the business session.

A partner in the law firm of Dahlberg, Simon, Jayne, Woolfenden and Gavne since 1946, Woolfenden has practiced law in Detroit since 1941. From 1922 to 1936 he practiced in Pontiac. He served as the first executive secretary of the state bar of Michigan from 1936 to 1942.

IN RECOMMENDING his appointment to the vacancy, Commissioner James S. Beresford mentioned that Woolfenden is a long-time resident of Bloomfield Hills and makes his home in an area not now represented on the commission. He also cited him as a man "of fine reputation."

Before making the appointment, the Hills city commission passed a resolution paying tribute to Mr. Eden, noting that he had twice served as mayor since 1944. "The city," it stated, "has lost a sincere and able public servant and Bloomfield Hills has lost an outstanding citizen."



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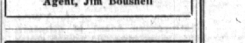
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
