B'ham Educational Area Shows 4 New School Locations

District Total Reaches 14

To take care of the expected record enrollment of more than 7,000 elementary school children, four Birmingham buildings will be opening their doors for the first time in September.

The four are Harlan, Greenfield, Valley Woods and Midvale schools.

Harlan school, district number one on the map, is expected to welcome 294 youngsters, sixth grade and under, when it begins operation on Adams road between Big Beaver and Wattles.

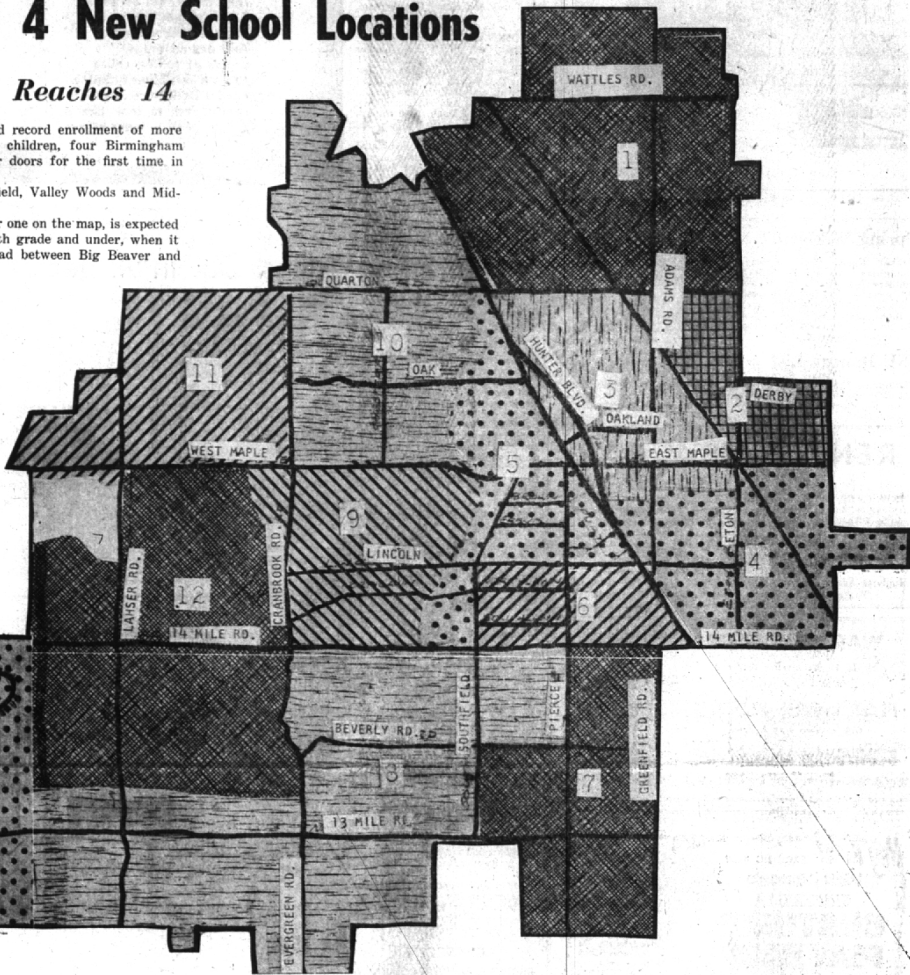
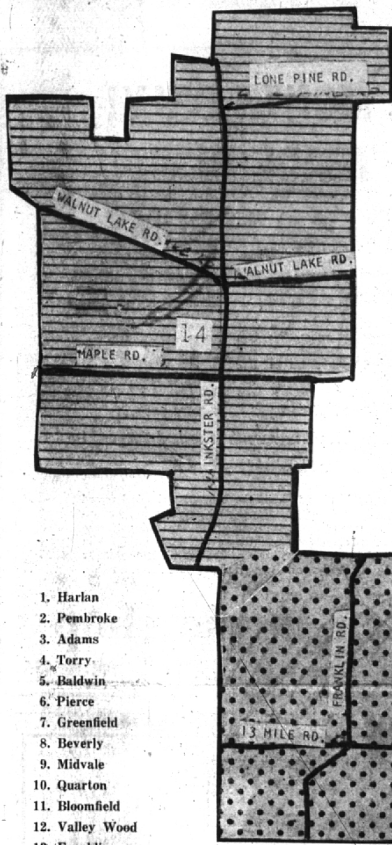
IT WILL RELIEVE the load on Adams school, which formerly enrolled from that area. Next year the Adams enrollment is expected to drop from 838 to 551 pupils.

Greenfield school (district 7) is expected to accommodate 812 pupils at its site at Fairfax and the west side of Greenfield road, near 13 Mile road. Pupils now attending Pierce school, and others now traveling by bus to Adams school, will switch to the Greenfield school.

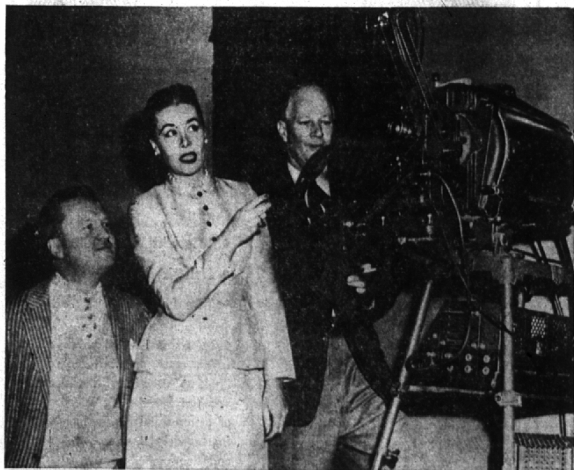
Pierce school's present load of 872 children, highest in the school district, will drop to about 730 in the fall.

Located on Bell Vine trail near Lahzer and 14 Mile roads, the Valley Woods school (district 12) expects to start classes with 448 pupils.

Midvale school (district 9) on a site behind Birmingham high school at Midvale and Maplewood street, is being readied for 299 pupils.
