Following the banquet there was an election of officers.

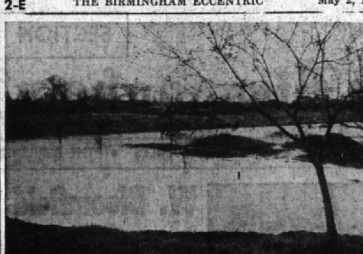
