## District Governor Installs Zontians

Speaking before members and newly installed officers of the Birmingham-Bloomfield Hills and Highland Park Zonta clubs, Wednesday evening, Edna Nairn, governor of Zonta International, District V, urged greater support of the Amelia Earhart scholarship fund.

She stressed the importance of the scholarship which permits young women in the engineering field to do advance study in aeronautical lines. Miss Nairn pointed out that more and more women are being accepted in the field and that the fund, honoring the memory of Zonta Amelia Earhart, is one of the group's most laudable projects.

The "international" aspect of Zonta, she said, is more powerfully felt in this district which crosses the border to take in a number of Canadian clubs. Herself a resident of Windsor, Miss Nairn said groups such as this can do much to keep up friendly relations and to promote better feelings in foreign countries.

Zonta groups also are being asked to appoint safety committees to promote general safety and to prepare themselves to work with civil defense agencies throughout the country.

She mentioned several prominent members who had recently been honored for their services in public affairs including aviation, medicine, radio and the theater.

After urging members to attend conventions whenever possible, Miss Nairn concluded her remarks by saying, "You will find Zonta the same as any other group. The more you put into it, the more you get out of it. It can assure you that there will be many wonderful friendships available to you, if you will but mix with others in other cities, states and countries."
