The Winklemanns were married in 1939 and moved to Stuttgart, Germany, where their sons were born. Mr. Winklemann worked as an engineer for the Mercedes-Benz Corp.

In 1951 the Chrysler Corp. invited Mr. Winklemann to visit their plant in Detroit. What began as a visit ended with his acceptance of a permanent position.

The following year found his charming wife, Friedel, and their two boys arriving stateside and the family making their home in Berkeley.

Mrs. Winklemann said that one of her first impressions on arriving in the states was the friendliness of the American people, especially that of her neighbors in Berkeley.

In 1955 the Winklemanns sold their home in Berkeley and moved to their present address in the Bras.

The entire family misses the beautiful mountains and the skiing of Germany, but all have made many friends and are very happy in their adopted country. Bernd, who is 16, is a pupil at Birmingham high school and Klaus 14, attends Derby.

On May 25 the Winklemanns will entertain 50 friends at a cocktail party to celebrate their newly acquired citizenship.
