



PETE JACKSON Pete Jackson Sets B'ham Golf Record

Birmingham's Pete Jackson set the individual school golf record last Wednesday with a sparkling 70 as he led the Maple golf team to 302-543 win over Grosse Pointe.
The Maples were only three strokes off the school team record as they romped to their fourth win in five dual meets. Other Birmingham scores were, Michigan, 75; Pete Green, 74; and Tom McDaniel, 82. Jeff DeFore was low for the Pointers with a 79.
Fighting 40-degree temperatures and high winds, Jackson beat the school record of 72 set by Bob Goldsmith in 1955.
Doug Dahn, Southfield tennis captain, unbeaten both this year and last, will be playing prestidigitational regional tomorrow and is expected to make a good showing for himself. Two years ago he won the Metropolitan Detroit News Novice tournament.
Number two man on the Southfield team is Mike Warren, a senior. Freshman Don Symons, who just started playing tennis this year fills out the number three singles position.
Southfield is not in a league this year. This is because only Berkeley and Southfield in the Interlakes League have tennis courts. The Southfield courts were just completed last year.

Watrous to Scotland For World Sr. Tourney

AL Watrous, Oakland Hills golf professional, is scheduled to leave for Scotland June 20 to compete for the International Senior Golfer's trophy.

Watrous said, "I will either win the tournament, or be runner-up. He won the all-expense-paid trip by winning the PGA seniors championship at Dandena, Fla., in January, and will compete against Jeff Burton, 53, the senior champion of England."
Watrous, a 58-year-old grandfather of 10, will play Burton in a 36 hole match at Glasgow June 24 and will stay over for the British Open beginning July 1.

IT IS 31 YEARS since he crossed the Atlantic and emerged as runner-up to Bobby Jones in the 1926 British Open.
But even that trip was not Watrous' first Atlantic crossing. During World War I he crossed the Atlantic several times as apprentice steerman in the USS President Grant, the Kaiser's supply ship converted into a troop transport.
He slept in a hammock below the deck and dreamed of the time when he would make the crossing in real style, up on a deck.
In spare moments, he would use a mop handle for a golf club and knock a little black carpenter wood off the deck into the ocean.

YEARS LATER, after Watrous was discharged and had become caddymaster at Red Run in Detroit and golf pro at Bedford, he made the 1956 crossing to the British Open and hit real golf balls off the deck into the water, but he traveled second class.
He finally realized his dream of going in style, up there on a deck, on the Queen Mary, in 1954, when Oakland Hills members sent him to the British Open.
