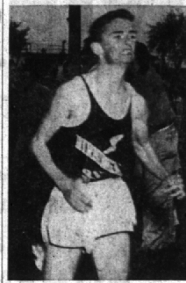

East Detroit, Class A champions moved ahead of Birmingham in the Regionals earlier this month, had rough going with the Maples in a dual meet last week.

Birmingham pulled away to an early lead with surprise wins in the shot put and broad jump. Maple's Chuck Gibson was first in the shot with a thrust of 50 feet, six inches. Sophomore Bob Kulow who had never won a track event before in his life, out-broad-jumped the Detroit trio who swept the event at the regionals. The jump was just under 20 feet. Kulow also shared a leg on the winning medley relay team, catching and passing his man with a brilliant burst of speed out of the turn.

Pat Berry led the pack in the dashes, running at :10.2 and :22.6 in the 100 and 220 events, respectively.

Hill McFarlen pole vaulted 12 feet one inch, the same height he won the state meet with this year.
