Budget

From \$3,000 to \$700. Truck rental and other expenses of \$3,000, would be eliminated, and figured as money would be chopped from \$3,000 to \$700. Five additional men authorized would not be hired. Pension money would be reduced by \$2,658 and uniform allowance would drop \$800.

IN THE FIRE department, salary reductions would amount to \$7,400 with addition of three firemen cancelled. Pension money would be cut by \$740, miscellaneous expenses would drop \$100 and a secretary for the planner would be deleted, saving another \$3,200.

An extra dog warden, at \$4,000 would not be hired and gas and oil consumption would be reduced from \$1,000 to \$400. An additional \$1,500 truck would not be purchased.

In the capital improvements department, outlays for a police car and radio would be cut by \$2,000, a planned road truck purchase, at \$4,200, would be eliminated and road maintenance equipment, valued at \$10,000 would be reduced to \$650.

PARKS and Recreation funds would be sliced by \$1,400 in the park maintenance area, salaries of \$5,000 would be eliminated and recreation equipment and supplies would be slashed from \$3,000 to \$1,000.

In addition, instead of cancelling pay raises granted in April, each employee will take a two-week vacation without pay or make other arrangements which will result in comparable savings of \$14,000.

No rubbish collections would be made in August, saving \$400; no road service for one month would mean an additional \$300 savings and there would be no police station addition, cutting the budget by another \$6,000.
