**Medical 'Quackery' At All-Time High; Post Office Finds**

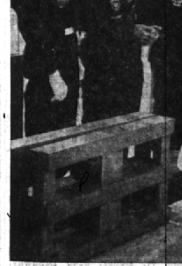
Residents of Birmingham, Southfield, Troy and Bloomfield townships receiving through the mails instances of medical quackery, frauds or otherwise offensive advertising material, are requested to report such cases to their post office immediately. It was urged today by Birmingham Postmaster Roland W. Reese.

Reese said his suggestion was prompted by newest reports he has received from Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield and Chief Inspector David H. Stephens that use of the mails for medical quackery is at an all-time high.

The local post office, Reese explained, under instructions from the postal inspection service, turns complaints of medical fraud, as well as all other complaints of other types of mail fraud over to post inspectors for prompt investigation.

**Plan 8-Week 'Camp' for Local Retarded Kids**

Birmingham's first parent-sponsored summer activity camp for handicapped children—actually the first in Michigan—will open July 8. It was announced this week by F. H. Allen, president of Birmingham Association for Handicapped Children.

The camp will provide supervised recreational and educational activities geared to capacities of the individual child.

It will include play and games both indoors and outdoors, music, movies, slide and trips to local points of interest.

Director will be a teacher certified in special education by the State and the school will be licensed by Michigan Department of Social Welfare.

This year's program will be open only to mentally retarded children in the 7 to 14 age group who are already enrolled in a class for the mentally retarded and have completed one year of school.

The association hopes to expand their next year's program to include all handicapped children in the Birmingham area.

A recent survey in this area showed the largest group of handicapped children who would benefit by such a program would be the mentally retarded.

"Activity Camp" will be located at the First Presbyterian church, 1669 W. Maple. Camp term will be eight weeks from July 8 through Aug. 20. Children will meet Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings from 9 to 12.

**Library Advisors Study Servicing Area Outside City**

Along with the problem of overcrowding, a newly formed Citizens' Library Advisory committee will study the problem of library service to the area surrounding Birmingham, now without public library service.

A statement released this week by the Friends of the Baldwin Public Library said the new committee will consider "whether or not there are advantages in an inter-community library."

It will also study library aspects of Birmingham's growing pains and report to the library board its recommendations.

The library, erected 30 years ago when the town numbered 8,000, is nearing the saturation point where it cannot add more books or serve more people.

The 12-member advisory committee was selected by the Friends of the Library at the request of the library board.

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**New Foundation Formed With Aid Of B'ham People**

A non-profit corporation known as the Foundation for Aid to Emotionally Disturbed Children had been formed to assist the child psychiatry program at Pontiac State Hospital.

The foundation intends to solicit funds and gifts so as to provide much needed additional personnel, school teachers, transportation and recreational facilities and other items which the state mental health budget is unable to provide.

The first board of trustees includes Dr. James M. McHugh, child psychiatrist and director of the child psychiatry program at the hospital, and Mrs. Edward E. Wilson, Raymond E. Danto, and John C. Emery, Jr., all of Birmingham. Mrs. Wilson was elected president of the foundation.

The following members from Birmingham were named to the advisory committee: H. C. Wildeman, Fred Jaynes, Carl Armburst and Thomas Marker.

Mrs. Wilson stated that the principal objective of the Foundation was to expedite the return to normal family living of the emotionally disturbed child patients. At the present time, Mrs. Wilson said, there are 55 boys and girls between the ages of six and seventeen in the hospital.

She stated that considerable progress had been made in the children's program at the hospital, but that the gap between the requirements of the program and the state funds provided was widening rapidly. It will be the function of the Foundation to seek aid and assistance from private citizens in meeting this critical problem of mental health in children, she said.
