Bob Robb is now back at Alma college where he is a freshman.

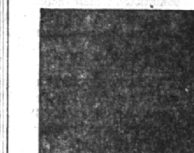

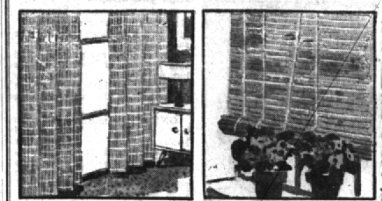
June Marriage Is Planned
