

Would Permit Greater Use of Business C Zone

Broadening of uses permitted under Birmingham's business C zoning classification will be considered at a May 13 public hearing.

Termed a most restrictive use by City Attorney Richard Adams, the ordinance presently permits only "offices-professionals" which city officials also have some difficulty in interpreting.

The proposed amendment would allow all residential dwelling construction, plus offices in which no retail storage or selling of goods is required.

John C. Palmer, 60, of 6235 Middlebelt road, died unexpectedly of a heart attack Saturday while working in his yard.

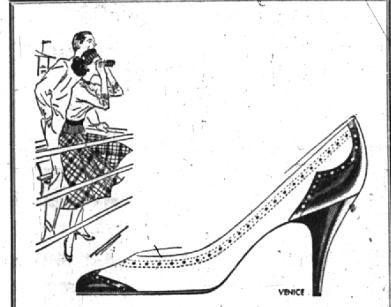
