

Delta Zetas Give Camp Scholarship

Delta Zeta Sorority members are actively aware of National Hearing Week, this year May 5-11. National philanthropic projects of this sorority include helping agencies and institutions working with the hard-of-hearing.

One phase of the newly-activated Oakland alumnae group's activity in the field of hearing will be eliminated during National hearing week. Funds raised by a benefit bridge-luncheon last November will be presented to the Oakland County special education department to send a hard-of-hearing child to camp this summer. Mrs. John Wilson, hearing consultant of the department will accept the check from Mrs. Cecil M. King, 753 Larchdale, Birmingham, social vice chairman of the local Delta Zeta group.

Frances Suzanne the hard-of-hearing children of Oakland County with whom Mrs. Wilson works, Billy Wilson, 20800 5 Mile road, Clarencville, has been chosen to be sent to the YMCA camp on Loon Island near Hale, this summer. Fourteen-year-old Billy was born deaf, but through training and practice is doing very well at speaking.

Throughout the year Oakland alumnae of Delta Zeta have worked with teachers of the special hard-of-hearing classes for Oakland County children. Teaching aids, such as flashcards, pictures, and special books to develop speech patterns, vocabulary, and lip-reading materials were raised in traveling "friendship" canisters credited among all Delta Zetas in Oakland County.

Mrs. Earl P. Long, 25504 West 14 Mile road, Bloomfield township, has been the contact person between the special teachers and the Delta Zeta alumnae. From the teachers it has been learned that there is no ordinary teaching assignment. In addition to the fact that their students cannot hear and speak normally, the ages and grade levels of two children in each room vary in much the same way as in a one-room school. Because of this, much extra teaching material is needed, as the same material cannot be covered in successive years when the children remain with the special teachers for several years before being integrated into the regular school programs when they have reached a certain level of proficiency in lip-reading.

Callaud College in Washington, D. C. is the only college in the United States exclusively for the hard-of-hearing. Physical facilities for the school are provided by Delta Zeta sorority members. At the present time, the endowment received from Delta Zeta is being used to build, furnish, and add books to this school's library, so that the accreditation of this unique institution can continue. Local alumnae have contributed funds raised by magazine subscriptions taken by Mrs. Harold E. Stahl, 3222 Auburn drive, Beverly Hills, and by the sale of sorority paper products by Mrs. Harold Van Dragt, 250 Bird, Birmingham.

Set \$608,614 Troy Budget

TROY — Adoption of a 1957-58, \$608,614 budget means city taxes will go up 70 cents per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

City commissioners okayed the figures after a public hearing Monday night. They chopped \$19,176 item for engineering a future city sewer and drain plan, but made the sewer engineering a separate item to be paid for by separate tax at a cost of 50 cents per \$1,000. With valuations tripled over last year, city commissioners could have charged \$4.80 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation and come up with the same taxes they received last year with a \$14.11 tax rate. The rate this year, however, is \$5.50.

The budget includes \$28,620 for land for a public works garage, \$44,000 for another fire hall, \$57,000 for road construction and \$55,000 for road equipment.

April Building Exceeds \$750,000

Birmingham's best building month so far this year was April, Building Inspector Andrew Butt reports. Permits totalling a valuation of \$752,335 were issued in that period, Butt said. They included three new single family residences, and two new businesses.

The new Greenfield restaurant started on Hunter blvd. accounted for \$400,000 of the month's total, and \$200,000 in alterations will be made to Redeemer Lutheran church on W. Maple.

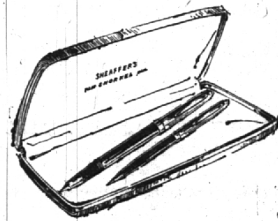
