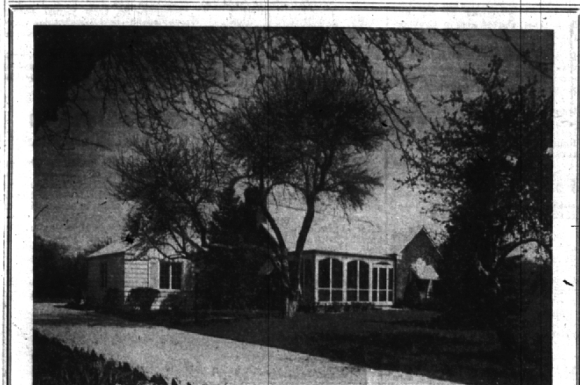
Carnival Workers Receive Thanks

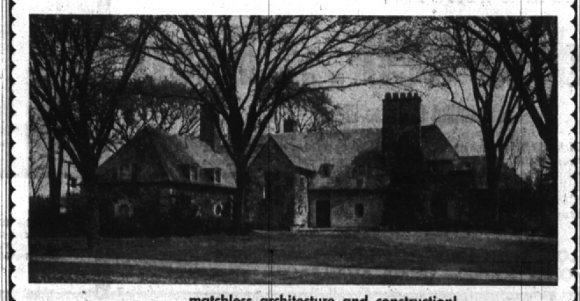

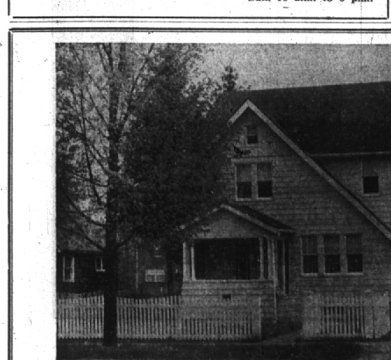

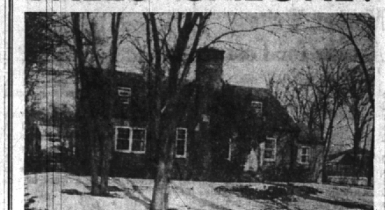
