Citizens Hear State Officials At Mass Meeting

Plans for a mass meeting of Oakland County citizens to hear state officials describe the state's financial crisis in relation to the problems of education and mental health were formulated recently at a meeting held in Birmingham and attended by representatives of county organizations.

Purpose of the mass meeting, which was held in the Dundero senior high school, Royal Oak, on April 30 at 8 p.m., was to present the budgetary problems faced by the Legislature in considering the needs for elementary-secondary and higher education, plus mental health in the State of Michigan. James Miller, director of the state department of administration, discussed the over-all state budget and pointed out the problems involved in bringing the budget into balance this year.

SINCE education and mental health are uncommitted, and therefore, the ones which are most likely to be cut if the budget is to be balanced, Mr. Miller explained the sources of income and the allotments to the various state agencies and also where mental health and education fit in to the total budgetary picture. Charles Wagg, state superintendent of mental health, discussed the mental health budget and the current problems and future outlook of his department. Dr. Clair Taylor, state superintendent of public instruction, presented the needs of the elementary-secondary schools and their financial picture. Speaking on the problems of higher education in Michigan was Dr. Clarence B. Hillberry, president of Wayne State University.

Among those attending the mass meeting were PTA council presidents in the county, including Mrs. John VanderRoest of the Birmingham council. Members of Birmingham board of education were also present.

Mrs. VanderRoest, Mrs. William Jackson, Mrs. John Ericson and Dr. Dwight E. Ireland also traveled to Lansing last week for another meeting on the same subject.

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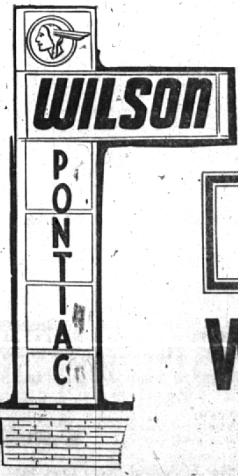
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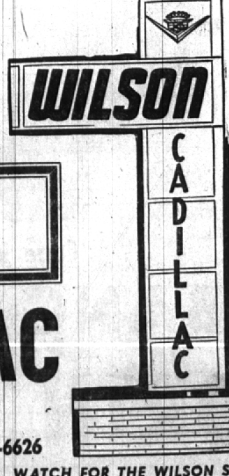
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
