WHEREAS, the property owner has agreed to dedicate an alternate easement at a location approved by the Detroit Edison Company and the City Engineer;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Commission do hereby find it advisable to consider vacating and abolishing the 12 foot easement extending from Edgewood to Floyd, south of Lots 1 to 14, inclusive, Birmingham Woodward Subdivision, with the center line of said easement being 106 feet south of and parallel to the southerly line of Lincoln Avenue.
