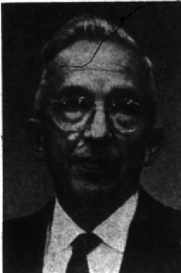

Dunstan Players to Appear In Courtroom Mystery Thriller

All the masterful suspense and mystery of Agatha Christie's tale of an English murder trial, "Witness for the Prosecution", will come to life this weekend and next as St. Dunstan's Guild presents its second production of the current season.

First presented on the London stage in the fall of 1953, "Witness" had a long and successful run there and then opened on Broadway a year later, where it stayed for 18 months. It is considered by many to be the author's best who-dun-it.

FOR THE FIRST time in several years, the public is invited to all performances of the Guild's November play. "Witness for the Prosecution" opens Friday evening at the Cranbrook Pavilion on Lone Pine road, and will continue Saturday, Nov. 16, as well as Friday and Saturday, Nov. 22 and 23. Curtain time is 9 p.m.

Jervis B. McMechan is directing a cast of 20 in this courtroom thriller. He is one of St. Dunstan's top directors, one who has given the local stage some of its best suspense. Among the many plays he has directed at St. Dunstan's are last season's very successful production of "The Desperate Hours", and a Greek Theater play of several summers ago, "Midsummer Night's Murder", of which he was the author.

Production manager on "Witness for the Prosecution" is Mrs. Lewis C. Kennan, Sr.

Mrs. Mark T. Jaroszewicz is making her first appearance on any stage in the leading role of Romaine, a star witness in the trial. Richard W. Miner is playing the part of the young defendant.

WORKING for the defense are Robert Harris, John S. Coppin, Mrs. F. C. Reith and George Heideman. On the prosecution staff are Dwight C. Ensign, Maurice F. Smith, Jr., and William Holmes. Rogers I. Marquis is cast as the judge.

Witnesses include Mrs. Marquis, Stanford C. Stoddard, John W. Knecht and Jasper B. Reid. Robert
