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Parties Original

In the month of November an appropriate party would be a HUNTING PARTY. Whether or not your friends are actually hunters, such a party is fun. It can be given for adults or children.

First, prove to your guests that you are in the hunt and is worth "Two in the Bush." Give each a peanut (in the shell) which you have previously glued with gold paint. This he just puts in his pocket but tell him it represents a 10-point deer.

But now comes the trick of really bagging two 5-point deer on his own. Have a tall lighted candle on a table and hand the guest a good sized funnel. Have him try to put the candle flame by standing about eight inches from the flame and blowing through the small end of the funnel. Give him two tries (or two shots at the deer).

THERE IS a catch to this—he can blow out the candle only if the funnel is lowered until the top edge of the large end is in line with the candle flame. If any guest is successful in putting out the flame in two tries, give him a pair of sardines to take on his hunting trip.

Next bring in a dish-pan of water in which is floating one-half pound of cranberries. Give each guest a pea-shooter, this is made by sticking a needle in one end of a Q-tip or a wooden skewer. Let each player throw his sardine until he misses and then it is the next one's turn and so on.

After the first round of tries, let them all try again. Always keeping the number of cranberries they miss. The player who throws his sardine at the end might win an inexpensive flashlight as an appropriate piece of hunting equipment.

THE NEXT GAME is to determine which hunter among your guests is the most expert shot. With a pea-shooter, this is done. Provide each player with a soda glass and ten toothpicks or matches the penny-box size. Place a small pan or dish about 4 or 5 feet away, have each player in turn, have a hit with a toothpick and try to land it in the pan. Pan is placed on the floor and players have to shoot from a distance.

To add to the fun, you might have a large floor-size plant in the center of the room. Have each player try to shoot, as though he were in the forest. Give ten points for each toothpick landed in the pan. Double score if he gets all of them in. Prize to high scorer might be a plastic toy deer.

THE NEXT GAME might be Bear Stalking. For this, the two playing must be absolutely silent and the fun is to see if you can keep the rest of the group silent too.

Two players are blind-folded and placed at either end of a long table. One is told he is the stalker and the other the bear. At the signal the stalker tries to catch the bear. Both MUST stay within touching distance of the table. They should have removed their shoes so there is no sound at all to give away the position of the bear to the stalker.

For this game, you have previously prepared hunting licenses for each guest. These can and should be as funny as you can make them. If, at the end of two minutes, the stalker hasn't caught the bear, he must forfeit his license to you. Players retaining their licenses after all have had a turn as stalker, win small bags of gold chocolate money. (Supposedly gained by the sale of the bear skin.)

YOUR FINAL game might be played to the tune "A Hunting We Will Go." This is an old, familiar folk tune and if you don't know it, just stop in at any music store and they can teach it to you in a hurry. Or chances are several of the guests will know it.

Select one person to leave the room. This should be someone who has lots of pep and imagination. While he is out, have the group decide upon something he is to do when he returns. This might be to remove the wrist watch from a certain person's wrist and lay it on a table, choose a certain lady and dance a few steps with her, or anything the group decides.

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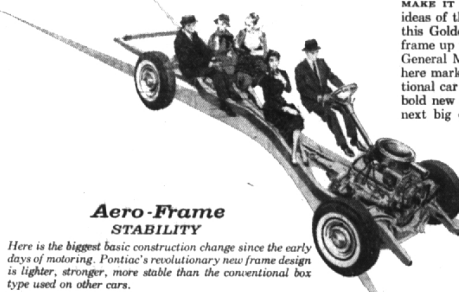
