## S'field Goodfellows Plan Paper Sale

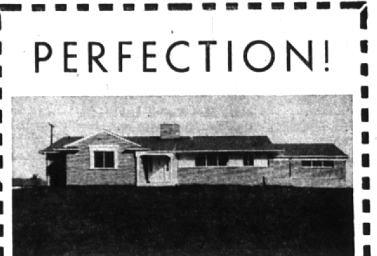
