Jays Finish Undefeated With Win over Redford

SOUTHFIELD—It was 25 to 7 at halftime and that's how the score stood at the end of the game as Coach Monte Charles' Big Blue charges wrapped up an undefeated season here Friday afternoon with a triumph over Redford Union.

The newly-crowned Inter-Lakes conference kings spotted the Panthers a 7-0 first-quarter edge and then pounced back to score four times before intermission. Three of the touchdowns came in the second quarter.

The Blue Jays ended their successful '57 campaign with seven wins. The only blemish on the Southfield record is an opening night 7-7 deadlock with Royal Oak Kimball.

It was the best record posted in the five-year history of the school. Teams coached by Charles have won 26 and lost 13 games.

The 1957 Jay gridlers racked up 185 points to 52 for their opposition.

Fumbles marred Southfield's performance in the finale. The Jays lost six of eight fumbles, and two of the fumbles wrecked scoring opportunities deep in Redford Union territory.

A fumble stopped one drive just a foot from paydirt. Another ended a push on the Redford Union 10. Tom Ridley put the Jays into the scoring column in the opening seconds of the first quarter. He rumbled 35 yards for the six points.

REDFORD FUMBLED the kick-

Southfield touchdown on a 43-yard sprint with five minutes left in the half. Two minutes later Bob Filer tossed to Ken Yauch for a 52-yard touchdown.

The 52-yard touchdown, which came with five minutes gone in the game, was scored by Russell Lech. Jim Patterson added the point.

RIDLEY was the leading Jay scorer this fall with 11 touchdowns. He also scored two and passed for seven. Moore tallied six times.

Troy, winner of five straight before losing two in a row to Clawson and Lake Orion, had to come from behind in the fourth quarter to tie Avondale, 7 to 7, Friday afternoon at Troy.

CRANBROOK broke into the scoring column with 30 seconds left

in the first quarter, the other in the final stanza. An unsuccessful Oak Park fourth-down gamble set up the second Haron score. Oak Park outgained and outplayed the Barons.

A GARY Littleton to Wayne Fieley touchdown pass saved Troy from its third straight loss. Dave Stone's 47-yard extra point tied the game.

Avondale had scored in the first quarter on a 61-yard sprint by Charles Nurek, Jerry Hill converting. The Colt foes never threatened again.

Troy threatened twice but couldn't score. Coach Joe Bechar's charges wound up the campaign with a 5-2-1 record.

Is a big, plump Canadian goose worth an icy dunking? Bloomfield Hills Patrolman Bob Randall figures it is.

Bob and another Hills police officer, Joe Kerr, were on a float trip one morning last week on Parsonville creek near Holly. One of the hunters had checked the area a few days earlier and the men knew ducks were plentiful. They were also aware of the possible presence of a few geese.

The two policemen saw several ducks winging about shortly before daybreak but hesitated to fire for fear it would disturb any geese on the stream.

A FOGGY MILE or so downstream their patience paid off. Right at dawn the unmistakable clucking of approaching geese sent the two heading for shore. They ditched their aluminum canoe and hit the brush just before 11 or 12 Canadian came in low. Six shots were fired and four geese hit the drink.

The men pushed the canoe into the stream to pick up the geese, but one of the honkers shot by Bob wasn't ready to call it quits. It took off across the stream, crashed through skim ice at the edge of the swamp and landed into the frost-covered underbrush.

Afraid of losing his bird, Bob, who hadn't time to reload his 12-Gauge, dove into the icy stream after the goose. By this time the bird had re-entered the stream around a bend and was trying to fly. Because of a bad shot, however, though, it couldn't get more than a foot or two off the water.

UP THE STREAM went the flapping goose and up the stream went the Hills patrolman. About 50 yards later he caught up with the wounded honker. By that time he was soaked from head to foot, and in those sub-freezing temperatures, it didn't take long for his clothes to freeze solid from top to bottom.

The men, in all, covered eight miles of stream. In addition to the limit bag of geese—one, incidentally, banded by Jack Miner at Kingsville, Ont.—they brought home a hen mallard.

LOSE 7-0 AS OFFENSE BOGS

90-Yard Run Provides Margin in Maple Defeat

BIRMINGHAM high school footballers saw their chances for an impressive finish this fall—despite a slow start—wiped out in a matter of seconds Friday night.

A Royal Oak Kimball workhorse back who had scored in the season was the spoiler. Knight Fullback Larry Wagen broke loose on the first play from scrimmage of the second half. Ninety yards later the game's only touchdown was registered on the scoreboard.

Frank Voeffray ran the extra point to make it 7 to 0 and a two-game Maple victory again ground to a halt just as it was beginning to gain momentum.

COACH CARL LEMBLE's charges went into Friday's Kimball battle envisioning finishing the campaign with four straight wins and winding things up with a 6-3 record. The Maple victory again ground to a halt just as it was beginning to gain momentum.

Instead they found their record all knotted up at 4-4. A win over another Royal Oak foe, Dondero, in this Friday's wrapup is needed to finish on the winning side of the ledger.

Kimball, in its first year of competition, ended with a 4-2-1 record. Next fall the new Royal Oak school will be an active member of the Eastern Michigan league.

Much of Friday night's troubles were due to a passing attack that wouldn't click and an overall offense that bogged with the Kimball goal in sight. Once deep inside Knight territory, Birmingham found itself unable to cover the ground needed for those important six points.

A fumble exchange set up the first Maple three late in the second quarter. Birmingham finally ending up with the ball near the Kimball 30.

Aided by two penalties, the Maples pushed to within six inches of the Royal Oak goal, but were unable to score.

KIMBALL HAD threatened earlier in the second. Fired by a 40-yard sprint by Voeffray, the Knights moved to the Maple seven but they were held.

The clock was stopped at 11:24 when Wagen completed his sparkling 90-yard jaunt. The touchdown followed a penalty on the kickoff that had moved Kimball dangerously close to its own goal.

Wagen barged between right tackle and end and scooted down the sidelines.

The kick for the point failed. Birmingham was offside. Voeffray's carry on the second try counted.

Mistake in the third quarter Birmingham drove to the Kimball 12 but was held. After that the Maples couldn't put together a

major offensive push.

WITH SIX SECONDS left in the game Birmingham held the Knights on the Maple one-yard line.

Friday's foe, Dondero, has a 4-3 record with wins over Water-

ford (26-0), Monroe (21-7), Highland Park (26-0) and Ferndale (12-7) and losses to Hazel Park (13-6), Farmington (24-0) and Grassie Pointe (43-0) on its record. The Oaks will have one game left after the Birmingham clash, with Wyandotte.

Top Dondero guns are Halfback Gary Banks, with six touchdowns and five extra points to his credit, and Fullback Jim Stierens, who has scored four times. Stierens is one of the Royal Oak team's leading rushers.
