



## Birmingham Visited By Foreign Students

Foreign students from the University of Michigan had an opportunity last weekend to view typical family life in Birmingham. They were graduate students who completed their undergraduate studies in their own country and are in Ann Arbor for 18 months to specialize in their chosen field.

Families here have graciously volunteered to open their homes to these students as a means of broadening their concept of American living—to say nothing of forming lasting friendships and, in a sense, act as foster families while the students are in this country.

THIS IS the first time an association such as the University of Michigan alumnae has sponsored this type of project, and Birmingham is one of the first communities to be visited by a group of foreign students. Later, this will be done in cities such as Grand Rapids, Flint and Cleveland.

It is interesting to note that among the 1300 foreign students in Ann Arbor, more countries are represented than in United Nations.
