Are You Helping Hub Cap Thieves? See An Engraver!

Expensive hub caps continue to vanish at a serious rate from automobiles parked in Birmingham's city limits, despite a police campaign to halt the thefts.

Detective Sgt. Robert Schaulie, Birmingham police juvenile officer, blamed the high theft rate on car owners' failure to take advantage of hub cap identification equipment now available.

Schaulie patterned the campaign here after several West Coast cities' measures, which resulted in about 75 per cent reduction in thefts. He secured the cooperation of city gas station owners, all of whom installed small vibrating machines to engrave car serial numbers on hub caps.

Schaulie urged motorists to ask station attendants to engrave their wheel discs. Once marked, the hub caps cannot be resold, and if stolen caps are recovered, their owners can be traced quickly.
