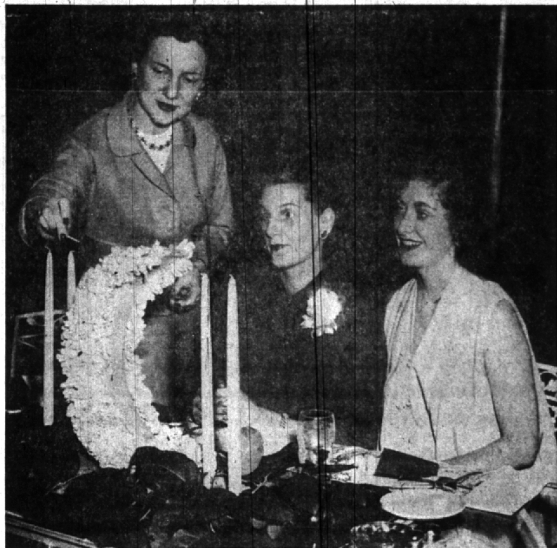

WHEREAS, this Commission has been requested by the property owner to vacate and abolish an existing easement in Birmingham Woodward Subdivision, in the block bounded by Lincoln, Floyd, Bonnaville and Edgewood, which easement was obtained for maintenance of public utilities and sewers in connection with other vacation proceedings (Resolution No. 121—April 30, 1945); and

WHEREAS, the present property owner has agreed to dedicate an alternate easement at a location which has been approved by the Detroit Edison Company;

WHEREAS, it appears that the existing Detroit Edison Company easement can be relocated in an alternate easement;

WHEREAS, the property owner has agreed to dedicate an alternate easement at a location approved by the Detroit Edison Company and the City Engineer;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Commission consider vacating and abolishing the aforesaid easement extending from Edgewood to Floyd, south of Lots 2 to 14, inclusive, Birmingham Woodward Subdivision, with the center line of said easement being 126 feet southeast and parallel to the southerly line of Lincoln Avenue; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Commission shall meet Monday, December 2, 1957, in the Consultation Room in the Municipal Building for the purpose of hearing any objections to the vacating and abolishing of said easement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that notice of such meeting together with a copy of this resolution shall be published in the Birmingham Eccentric two successive weeks prior to the second day of December, 1957.

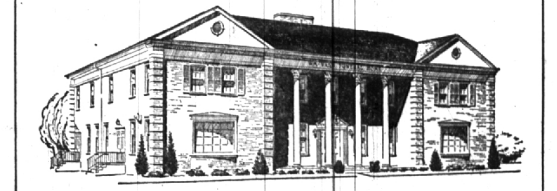
