Consider Sewage Request

SOUTHFIELD—A request to discharge sewage from 10 proposed semi-commercial buildings in Southfield township into the north branch of the Evergreen interceptor sewer via Birmingham being made by Paul J. Monohon associates of Detroit.

The Birmingham city commission has instructed City Manager L. Richard Gray to investigate the request and report back.

ACCORDING to Monohon, the proposed buildings would house both professional and semi-professional offices. The buildings are to be erected on lots one through 28 of Henry Wiegman's Echo City subdivision at the southeast corner of Pierce and 14 Mile roads, Southfield.

Monohon says the proposed buildings each would house seven to eight persons "giving a possible sanitary sewage discharge of some 8,000 gallons a day."
"All storm water from the area would be directed into the Acacia Park drain."

MONOHON says the proposed 12-inch sewer line would tap into the 30-inch line on the north side of 14 mile.

"The proposed tap," he says, "is to be considered as temporary and will be discontinued when the south branch of the Evergreen interceptor is constructed, at which time direct discharge can be made into the Acacia Park drain."

Noon Lunches Meeting Topic

EAST SOUTHFIELD—As a result of the controversy over the lunch period at East Southfield school, Marian Sims, school principal and Glenn Schenck, superintendent of schools met with parents last week to discuss the situation.

The school is now a "walking school" with a few students coming by bus. It is believed that the children should have lunch at home in an effort to provide the teachers with a lunch period partially free from supervisory responsibility.

The following exceptions will be made: children in grades one through three who live more than one-fourth of a mile from school would be permitted to stay.

IF THE MOTHER is the sole support of the family, lower elementary grade children would be allowed to remain. Students who must attend the school which is outside of their own area, and those who have to cross 12 Mile road can stay at the noon hour.

Parents are invited to contact the school principal to discuss their particular problem.

MONOHON SAYS officials of the North Evergreen authority have "no objection to treating at their Birmingham sewage plant the quantity of sanitary sewage already outlined."

The state department of health has told Monohon to try to reach agreement with the authority. It has said it will not give further consideration to his suggestion that a separate treatment plant be constructed to discharge to the Acacia Park drain unless the first plan is rejected.

Biggest Hole Gets Deer for Area Man

A Southfield man won a slain deer last Friday because his rifle made a bigger wound than that of his opponent.

Richard Mowery, 21785 Indian road, Southfield, and Richard Aubrey, Toledo, Ohio, both fired at a deer near Onaway, Mich., and both claimed the animal when it fell dead.

State Police Trooper John Side decided to settle the argument by having both men fire at the fallen animal from a distance of 100 feet with the deer going to the hunter whose rifle made the biggest wound.

Overtaken Truck Spills Gasoline

SOUTHFIELD—Southfield firemen and state police stood guard for nearly four hours last Thursday when one of the two gasoline tankers being pulled by a truck overturned on Telegraph near the Eight Mile road.

An estimated 500 to 1,000 gallons of gasoline spilled into the street but no fire was touched off. The firemen stood at the ready until the gasoline was cleaned up. Traffic was re-routed during the incident.

Fire officials said a total of 4,100 gallons of gasoline was carried in each of the tankers.

The truck driver, R. L. Cunningham, told officials his brakes locked when he neared the intersection. He said that when he looked back

he saw one of the tankers lying on its side. Cause of the accident has not been determined. The truck and trailers belong to the Sinclair-Cowdrey at 10455 Ford road, Dearborn.
