ORDER OF MICHIGAN CONSERVATION COMMISSION REGULATING FISHING IN SPECIAL TROUT PONDS. The Conservation Commission, by authority of Act 219, P. A. 1956, as amended, hereby orders that for five years from January 1, 1957, it shall be unlawful to harvest or attempt to harvest as hereinafter provided to fish in Beld Mountain Trout Pond, Section 16, T. 4 N. R. 13 E. and Section 24, T. 4 N. R. 13 E. Devils Den Trout Pond, Section 16, T. 4 N. R. 13 E. and Section 24, T. 4 N. R. 13 E. and Section 24, T. 4 N. R. 13 E. of Oakland County. Fishing shall be limited to the period from one hour before sunrise to one hour after sunset. 2. Artificial fish only may be used. For the purpose of these regulations, the term "artificial fish" shall be defined as any form of either "dry fly" or "wet fly" as ordinarily used in fishing and which shall not have attached thereto or used in connection therewith any type of description. 3. No boat or raft shall be placed or used on the ponds. 4. The daily limit shall be three (3). Approved September 16, 1957. 37,38,39

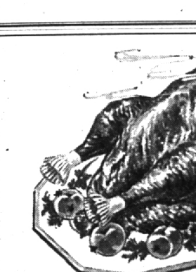
