From Detroit they flew to Switzerland where they enjoyed a motor trip across the country and then went to Vienna, Austria.

Leaving Europe from Vienna, they flew to Istanbul, Turkey and then to Cairo, Egypt where they visited the sphinx and pyramids and experienced a brief but thrilling camel ride.

Their next stop was Karachi, Pakistan and then on to Delhi, India. Here they took a 120-mile trip by train to see the Taj Mahal at Agra. The Taj Mahal is still a thing of beauty but they found that some of it is deteriorating. India is trying to restore it but has not been able to find the right substance to hold the marble together.
