WHAT DOCTORS SAY ABOUT:

Boxing Acne Scars

Q. Do boxers actually become punchy or does this happen only in the movies?
A. Some burned out fighters certainly act punchy. Two New York doctors carefully examined 1043 professional boxers before and after fights. So far as the physicians could tell the fighters, even those who had been knocked out in the ring, suffered no serious injury. But repeated punches to the head must take their toll. A physician in Finland examined a great many boxers and found that more than half had punchy symptoms. Boxing is increasing in popularity and is included in some athletic programs. The Committee on School Health of the American Academy of Pediatrics does not favor boxing for preteen-age boys. A University of Kentucky doctor goes even farther. He says that from a medical standpoint, boxing is taboo regardless of age.

Q. Can anything be done to smooth a face scarred by acne?
A. Yes. Skin specialists now have a way of grinding or planing off facial scars. The method isn't a sure cure but many patients with severe scarring have been helped. It goes something like this. The doctor plan-

"Freezes" the skin with a spray and then removes the top layer of skin by means of a power tool. The patient feels no pain. There is usually some bleeding from the treated skin so a dressing is applied and kept in place for about 24 hours. The crust that forms over the treated area usually comes off in about two weeks. At first the new skin is a bit red but the color gradually fades. Skin planing sounds more drastic than it really is. One specialist said that in over 7,000 planings not one of his patients had serious after-effects.

Mrs. Thomas Bolton of Suffield will turn her duties over to Mrs. Judge W. Rearden of Tottenham, the new chapter chairman.

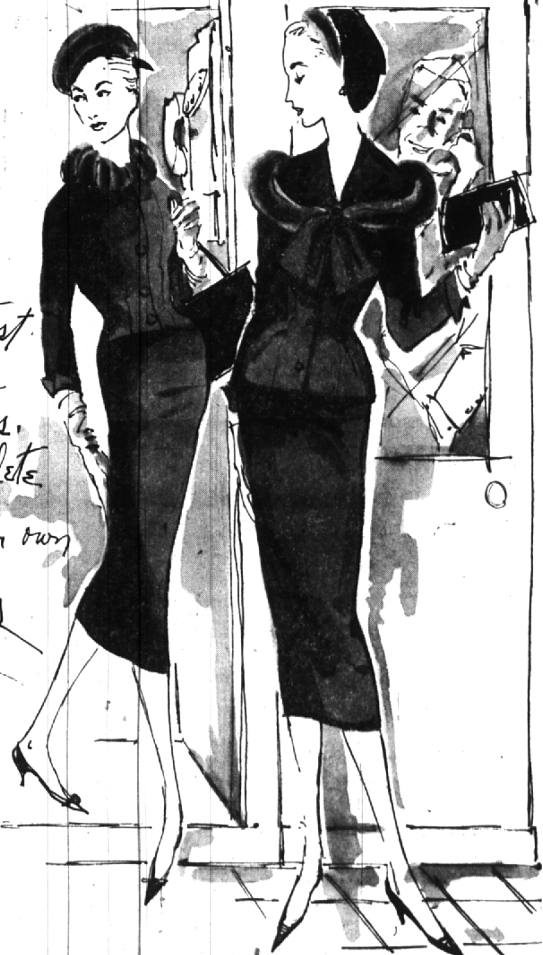
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
