Clothes over 125 Years Old

Marion "Mame" Daniels Blakeslee, grandheice of Southfield's first settler, John Daniels, and Chan Smith, Mrs. Blakeslee's neighbor, model clothing worn by John Daniels' mother and father who followed their son to Michigan in 1831. Both passed away in 1832. The clothing is homespun, handwoven, and the buttons on the coat are hammered brass. Smith is sporting a "belaver top," which at the time was quite popular, Mrs. Blakeslee resides in Waterford.



Ancient Broadhead Axe

Charles G. Parks, 555 Merrill, Birmingham, exhibits a broadhead axe which his grandfather, John Parks used to trim timbers in the 1820s when he was foreman of a crew constructing docks on the Hudson river in New York. John Parks was killed in 1838 on Woodward (the old corduror yoad) when a wagonload of hay he was taking to Detroit overturned on him.

Julia Michael Recalls Presbyterian History

TO THE EDITOR:
Your articles in The Eccentric were sent to me by Mias
Sara Enniss. I was surprised to learn that my grandfather,
Rev. Daniel Michael preached in the old Presbyterian church.
(EDITOR'S NOTE: Actually there is no proof that Michael
was the presbyterian church's pastor. We could only assume
this since he was buried in the church's cemetery northeast
of the 10 Mile-Lahser intersection.)
My father, Mahlon Michael was always under the impression that he preached somewhere around Redford, but my
father was only 12 years old when his father died (in 1868),
so he may have been mistaken.

I DO NOT REMEMBER all the ministers we had but I know a Mr. McFadden preached there. Also a Mr. Ray. I have a bible with a certificate in it that Rev. J. K. MacGilivray signed in Aug. 5, 1900 that I had perfectly memorized and recited the Westminster Shorter Catechism.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: If Wiss Mithael's 1900 date is correct she would have been 18 at the time! Also I have an autograph allum that the Rev. Benjamin Jones signed in Aug. 13, 1901 so he preached there about that time.

THE PHOEBE RUSSELL you mentioned in your paper was my grandmother's sister and Halsey Stephens was her brother's son. (My grandmother's maiden name was

brother's son. (My grandmother's maiden name was Stephens.)
Halsey Stephens was superintendent of the Sunday school when I received my Bible.
I remember attending my grandmother's funeral. I was only five. My sister, Abbie was three.
The one thing that stands out in my mind was the doors on the pews. The family always sat together and the door sclosed.
