Woodcreek Surveys Inspection Facilities

WOODCREEK FARMS—For a brief time until Woodcreek Farms village is able to enter into a contract with Farmington township for inspection services, facilities of the building restrictions committee of the Woodcreek association will be used.

At the council's Oct. 1 meeting, attorney Wendell Brown indicated it was probable that Farmington would agree to a building inspection shortly, but some interim inspection would be necessary for minor projects pending.

Clerk Arthur Busch was authorized to issue building permit applications subject to approval by council.

Council attention was also focused on approximately 25 to 30 advertising signs reported within the village limits on James Cousens highway which exceed the legal limitations of 3x3 feet.

"Many of these signs constitute an obstruction to drivers' vision," president Alger Clark stated. "They're a hazard at important intersections and must be removed either by the state, county or the village."

Determined by the 1950 census, a settlement of funds from Farmington township was also agreed upon, by resolution of council.

With an estimated population of 250 in 1950, Woodcreek Farm's share of state monies was set at 2.307 per cent and receipts in that amount would be forthcoming to the village coffers in about 45 days effective July 1, the date of incorporation.

Another resolution authorized president Clark and clerk Busch to sign a joint resolution with officials of Farmington township in order that funds would start to flow to the small municipality which has not had any funds in three months of operation.

President Clark also reminded his colleagues that three of the six minutes allowed for the consideration of ordinances had already passed and he urged them to give serious consideration to speed limits on village roads, building and health ordinances and a dog ordinance.

A letter from W. H. Gallagher, Farmington assessor, was read to advise the council that Farmington was in the process of reassessing properties throughout the township. The letter also offered the services of that department if the young village required a tax basis for collecting millage.
