Peter Kalinke Guest Speaker At PTA Meeting

WALNUT LAKE—The Oct. 14, PTA meeting of the Walnut Lake school will present as its speaker, Peter C. Kalinke. Kalinke, born in Breslau, Germany, became one of the youngest war correspondents of the German army.

He was taken prisoner by the Soviet army while broadcasting in Prague C.S.R. He worked for three years in stonefields and mines in Soviet Azerbaijan, near the Persian border.

He was released in January, 1950, to East Germany and occupied to West Germany, in March, 1950, he enrolled as an economy and political science major at the Goethe university in Frankfurt am Main.

LATER in 1950, he went to Paris and studied for one year at the Alliance Francaise. He returned to the University of Frankfurt

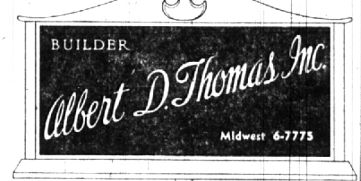

Kalinke will discuss the reeducation campaign of the Soviet government and its effect. Case stories will be used to illustrate his lecture.
