

Our Lady School To Be Dedicated By Bishop

Sunday at 2 p.m. Our Lady Queen of Martyrs school, Pierce at Dunblaine, will be dedicated and solemnly blessed by the Most Reverend Henry E. Donnelly D.D., auxiliary bishop of Detroit. He will be assisted by Father Stanley Fedewa of St. Michael's, Monroe, Father Thomas Kenny of St. Columban's, Birmingham, and Father Cyril Keating of St. Bede's, Southfield.

Father John F. Finnegan, Ph.D., of St. Patrick's, Detroit will deliver the sermon. Minor ministers of the ceremony will be the altar boys of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs church, headed by Michael Schuck.

Following dedication, 400 of the students will receive the sacrament of confirmation from Bishop Donnelly. A large number of visiting priests from the Archdiocese of Detroit will be welcomed by Father Louis A. Herbert, pastor of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs, Father Leo E. Tette, the assistant and Sister Mary Helen, school principal.

THE DEDICATION and blessing of Our Lady Queen of Martyrs school marks the completion of the present building. School enrollment has now reached 710 students taught by seven Sisters of Charity from Cincinnati, eight lay teachers, a music teacher, two priests and an athletic director.

Our Lady Queen of Martyrs school began in Sept. 1954 in six first floor classrooms. In 1955 the second floor was constructed and last year the addition of four more classrooms was begun and opened in Sept. 1957.

Along with the library, clinic, office, music room and assembly hall adjacent to the church, these classrooms barely accommodate the children of the parish. Father Herbert is presently conferring with the architect on plans for most facilities which will be needed in the near future.

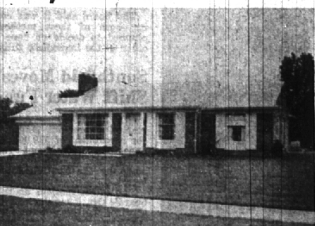

Southfield Studying Rezoning Request

SOUTHFIELD — The Southfield township board has passed and sent a resolution to the zoning board which calls for rezoning a lot on the east side of Northwestern highway, south of 12 Mile road.

The resolution was passed after a petition was presented by the National Bank of Detroit which pointed out that "the frontage now zoned commercial for 250 feet and with the State highway department taking 114 feet, it would not leave sufficient area for parking."

The resolution will be considered by the zoning board and a recommendation given after a public hearing is held.

Begin S'field School Improvement Program

Southfield board of education embarked upon a driveway parking area and sidewalk improvement program for its schools in the district Monday which is estimated to cost \$145,895.

Bids will be taken at a special meeting Oct. 28 for grading, drainage and blacktopping programs at the high school, Lathrup, Angling Road, Brace, McKinley and E. Southfield schools.

Because there is the possibility that the ground may freeze before work can be completed, the board instructed Dolner and Rollason, engineers for the project, to obtain bids for both the complete job being done this fall and also for rough grading and fill work to be done now with blacktopping to be completed next spring. Work at Angling Road and Brace schools was termed "most urgent."

HIGHEST ITEMS on the program are improvements for the high school, including drives and a parking lot on the north side of the school. Engineers suggested a 500-car parking area, but the board decided to blacktop only about half the area if it would reduce the estimated total costs of \$92,700 for the high school improvements. The program is half of a two-part plan which includes playground recommendations estimated at \$48,485 but decided to wait until spring to begin work.

THE BOARD VOTED to join the South Oakland county branch child guidance clinic at a cost of \$3,386 for one year.

"If it saves one child, it's worth the cost," declared Charles L. Curtis in moving that the district join the clinic. Superintendent Glenn Schoenals explained that the district now sends its children to Pontiac to the Oakland County child guidance clinic, he said, is very crowded.

A SCOUT swimming program for Saturday afternoons at the high school pool was approved. The board also okayed use of the gymnasium at Southfield No. 10 school after hours by St. Michael's guidance clinic during basketball season.

Overtime coaching salaries of \$250 each were voted for wrestling and swimming coaches for varsity teams.

Franklin Is Without Road Chief

Franklin — The resignation of Councilman J. Robert Mitchell became effective Oct. 15 leaving Franklin village without a street administrator.

It was the decision of the Franklin village council Monday night to defer appointment of Mitchell's successor until a suitable replacement could be found.

Until such time, all matters concerning village roads will be handled by joint action of the council. Although he will remain on the council until his term expires in March, Mitchell declined an offer by Harold Roseberry, president, to remain in the capacity as road chief till then. A motion was then passed commending him for his excellent job.

During the meeting, the council passed a motion stating that a cash deposit would be refunded by the village as soon as the subdivision developer provides a security bond for a like amount.

Council members agreed to meet with the village planning commission to discuss a recreational area. As many members as possible will attend the Oct. 28 meeting.

A letter was read from Mrs. Olive Tillotson of Romany Way concerning the fact that since the council did not feel liable for damage to her gardens during summer rains, she would pursue the matter in court. The matter was tabled until further notice from her attorney.
