WHAT DOCTORS SAY ABOUT

- Brain Waves
- Peace Pills

Q. Do doctors know what happens in the brain when people lose their mind?

A. In some cases they do but in others the trouble is hard to locate. Mental disease is the number one problem today and much work is being done in trying to solve the mysteries of brain function. Day and night the brain gives off telltale electrical impulses. By recording these brain waves, doctors are better able to diagnose certain brain disorders. Brain waves are usually picked up by tapping on the scalp. Mayo Clinic doctors have obtained clearer "pictures" of brain waves by using tiny pickup wires that are inserted into the brain through small holes in the skull. Deep probing of the brain is certainly not an everyday affair, even at the Mayo Clinic. Fewer than 100 people have probably been treated in this way but the information obtained is very valuable.

Q. Are nervous and mental patients ever cured by the new tranquilizing drugs?

A. The new "peace pills" are useful but probably have no overall curative effect. As

one doctor said, tranquilizers strengthen the patient so that he can be helped to find and overcome his trouble. Tranquilizers are useful drugs but only when taken under the direction of a physician. The American Psychiatric Association and other medical groups have taken a firm stand against the use of "peace pills" by every Tom, Dick, and Harry who thinks he needs something to settle his nerves.
