National Bank Wins Lathrup Road Bonds

LATHRUP—National Bank of Detroit was successful bidder on \$31,000 worth of special assessment paving bonds to be issued by the city for 1957 paving projects. Only other bidder, McDonald-Moore of Detroit, was slightly higher in their proposed rate of interest.

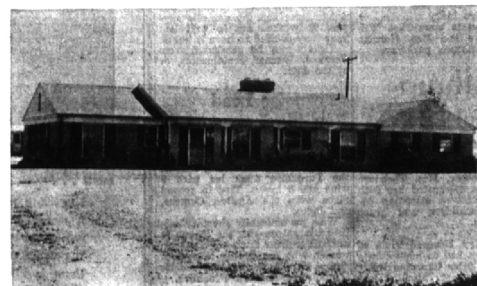
