Around the World in Two Months

To Study Current Trends Is Aim of Hammarstroms



CRANBROOK—Early this month, Mr. and Mrs. Dlav Hammarstrom of Academy road began an exciting trip around the world. Their schedule called for them to visit 16 countries before returning home Dec. 16.

To study current trends in architecture, arts and crafts and small industry and to become better acquainted with many of the architects, artists, designers and craftsmen responsible for these trends were the objects of their trip. Included on the Hammarstroms' calendar of events are informal illustrated lectures which they plan to give, plus group seminars and private consultations on interiors, textiles, ceramics, metalwork, production efficiency, domestic and export marketing.

BOTH MR. AND MRS. Hammarstrom are eminently fitted for this ambitious undertaking and have already been scheduled to speak at universities and art schools in many different countries from Great Britain to Bali, Turkey, Thailand, Indonesia, Hong Kong, Japan, the Philippines and Hawaii. Mrs. Hammarstrom, whose professional name is Marianne Strenge, is head of the department of weaving and textile design at the Cranbrook Academy of Art. She is well known nationally for her work with industry, and particularly for her fabric designs and interiors for the General Motors technical center. Mrs. Hammarstrom has also received acclaim for her fabrics for automobile interiors.

HAMMARSTROM, WHO is an architect, received his training in

Finland in architecture and city planning. After coming to this country, he became a citizen. During his career he worked with Eero Saarinen on the technical center and is now specializing in residential buildings, interiors and furniture design.

In 1951, both Mr. and Mrs. Hammarstrom spent several months in the Philippine Islands. They were sent there on a mission for the United Nations and the purpose of the visit was to help develop home industries on the islands.


Mrs. Shank is recording secretary of the Scandinavian Society and Mr. Brown is corresponding secretary.


Behind the Scenes of TV

Local Girl Assists Show

Have you ever wondered while watching television what goes on behind the scenes in a TV studio? Let's take a look at the daily routine of a production assistant.

"This is Her Life"—Carol Hogshead, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Brent K. Hogshead of Henrietta, Birmingham. As a youngster, Carol like other young girls, had hopes and dreams of becoming a great actress.



SHE NEVER REALIZED that her ambitions would lead her to the profession of production assistant for the Chuck Berguson show—"Ladies Day" Mr. Berguson, MC of the show, is a resident of Franklin.

"Being an assistant director has many advantages and disadvantages—among the excitement of meeting people from all walks of life and the variety of work involved, it entails many responsibilities and great pressure during the show," comments Carol.

CAROL'S JOB includes handling theatre reservations, selecting constants for audience participation stunts and booking guest stars such as Jerry Lewis, Sal Mineo and Eartha Kitt, who have appeared in the past.

Although it seems a near impossibility, one camera is all that is needed on the show. A crew of 22 men work together behind the scenes day after day to make "Ladies Day" a success.

Among the many departments in a studio are the clients viewing room, announcement room, control room and projection room, where commercial films and slides are stored.

THE PROGRAM is controlled by men in the control room who relay vital information to the floor man-

ager as to length of time remaining, posture correction and speaking volume. He in turn has his own system of bringing about the necessary changes and seeing to it that they are made.

Various stunts are employed by shows of this type to create laughter and enthusiasm in the audience, such as—squirr suits, buckets of confetti and other proven aids to provoke laughter.

Carol being a resident of Birmingham for eight years graduated from Birmingham high school in 1952. She then attended Michigan State university for one year and transferred to University of Missouri, where she graduated in 1956.

MAJORING IN JOURNALISM, she was affiliated with Chi Omega sorority. Carol's hobbies are writing, swimming and bowling on the Radio-TV league.

"In most industries, clock watchers are poorly rewarded, but in the world of TV they are very highly regarded; show split second timing is imperative in modern broadcasting."
