## Parties Original

If you are soon to entertain a group of adults and would like to play a few games during the evening, perhaps some of the games explained here will be helpful or give you ideas for something else to do.

When you read about a game or hear of one that appeals to you, it doesn't always have to be done just the way you learn of it's having been done. You can always alter it to fit your particular crowd or purpose.

You can possibly add to it or change it to make it more fun, funnier or more adaptable to your space or to the number in your party. Be imaginative and versatile with your entertaining.

WHEN YOUR GUESTS have arrived, give all of the men an equal amount of play money. The one who has the most left at the end of the evening, gets a prize. With their money, the first game they might play would be called "Rose and Lemon."

Give one girl in the group a rose and one man a lemon. Tell the girl to pass the rose as quickly as possible to another girl, who hands it on to a third girl and so forth. In the same way the men are to keep the lemon passing from one to another.

After two or three minutes, the hostess claps her hands and the girl with the rose and the one with the lemon at the time are called to the front of the room. The hostess then hands the man a small prize or trinket which he is to hand to the lady. As soon as he does, he is presented with a bill for it.

REPEAT THE GAME several times until several men have been dunned for some of their money.

Another way to make them pay out their money is to play Magic Treasure Hunt. Collect in one box slips of paper on which are written the names of all girls present. In another, similar slips with the names of the men. Select one of the girls and one of the men to draw out the slips, each drawing from the box containing the names of the opposite sex.

To each fifth name of a girl that is called, the hostess presents some cheap trinket and to each fifth man, the bill for it.

PLAYING "I WANT THAT" will also cost the men money. Have a table on which there are a number of white elephant articles such as a small bundle of bobby pins, a silver key ring, a comb, bits of cast off jewelry, etc. Under each item, you have previously placed, face down, a price tag.

Pair the couples off by having them draw slips of paper from a hat on which is written such names as POP CORN and on the lady's slip will be MAW CORN. Then there might be Mrs. Bean and Mr. Bean, Mrs. Nut and Mr. Nut, Father Knob and Mother Knob, etc.

AS SOON as they have their partner, they may go to the table and the girls select one of the items. Naturally the man picks up the price tag and adds it to the expense of the evening.

At the close of the games, the man having had to spend the most of his play money gets a booby prize and the man having spent the least gets first prize. Just the opposite, the girl who has made the man spend the most on her, gets a first prize while the one who has had the least spent on her gets the booby prize.

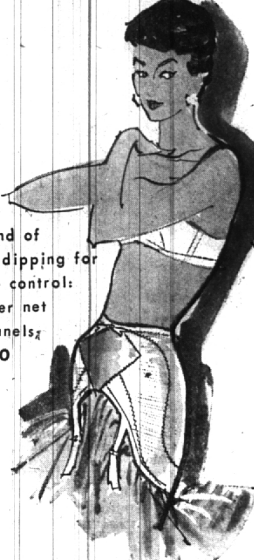
