Youth Club Plans 'Harvest Hop'

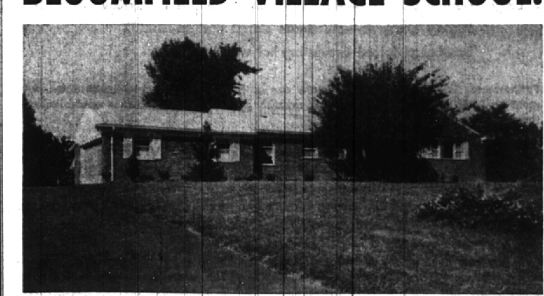
