Farmington remains the only obstacle in the path of Southfield high's first Inter-Lakes conference football championship.

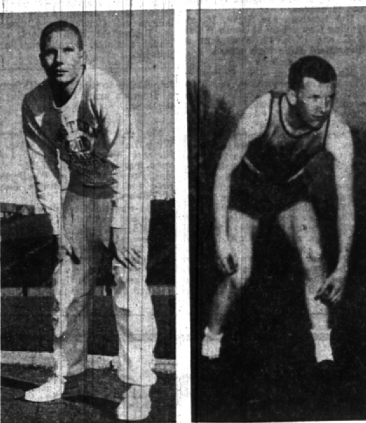

Shute Elected To Golfing Hall of Fame

Denny Shute, the last man to win two consecutive PGA Championships, performing the feat in 1936 and 1937, has been elected to the PGA Golf Hall of Fame by vote of the nation's press and golfing officials.

The capable and popular Shute joins a select list of golf immortals already in the PGA Hall of Fame. This list includes Walter Hagen, Bobby Jones, Gene Sarazen, Francis Ouimet, Walter Travis, Chick Evans, Alex Smith, Jim Barnes, Johnny McRumrutt, Willie Anderson, Jerry Travis, Tommy Armour, Byron Nelson, Ben Hogan, Sam Snead, MacDonald Smith, Leo Diegel and Craig Wood, who was elected last year.

Besides Shute's spectacular accomplishments in winning two consecutive PGA championships, he won the British Open in 1933 and was runner-up in the United States Open in 1941. He was also a member of four PGA U.S. Ryder Cup teams—1931, 1933, 1935 and 1937.

HE RANKS as one of the game's greatest teachers and is golf professional at the Portage country club, Akron, Ohio. He has played in the last three PGA Seniors' Championships at Dune-dine, Florida and was runner-up in 1955.

Annually the PGA Hall of Fame committee nominates five men for balloting, then the names of the five men and ties are sent to the PGA press list whose members elect one new member to the hall of fame. In 1954 there was an eligibility change requiring that nominees be retired from competition and be at least 50 years of age.

SHUTE HAD 100 votes, with Jack Hutchinson, Sr., his closest rival, compiling 86 votes. Other results of the voting were Johnny Farrell, 75 votes, Olin Dutra, 49 votes, Fred McLeod, 27 votes and Tom Kerrigan, nine votes.

Dick Mayer Named PGA Professional Golfer of Year

National Open and world champion, Dick Mayer, compiling a record-breaking 532 votes, has been named PGA "Professional Golfer of the Year" for 1957 by the Professional Golfers' association of America.

The golfing stylist from St. Petersburg, Fla., amassed the highest total of votes ever received in the 10-year history of the PGA professional golfer of the year award and his 532 votes far surpassed those cast for the next highest choice, Dow Finsterwald, who received 44 votes. Sam Snead was third with 29 votes, Doug Ford fourth, with 29, and Jimmy Demarest fifth with 25 votes.

MAYER will receive his award at the President's dinner at the PGA annual meeting at Long Beach, Cal., Nov. 12. This is the 10th year of the award.

Ben Hogan won the award in 1948-1950-1951 and 1953. Others were: Sam Snead, 1949; Julius Boros, 1952; Ed Furber, 1954; Doug Ford, 1955; and Jack Burke, Jr., 1956.

A record total of 713 votes were cast by the nation's professional golfers, press and other golfing officials in this year's poll.

The late Charles E. (Gus) Dorais had a record of 112 wins, 48 losses and seven ties in 18 years as head football coach at University of Detroit.

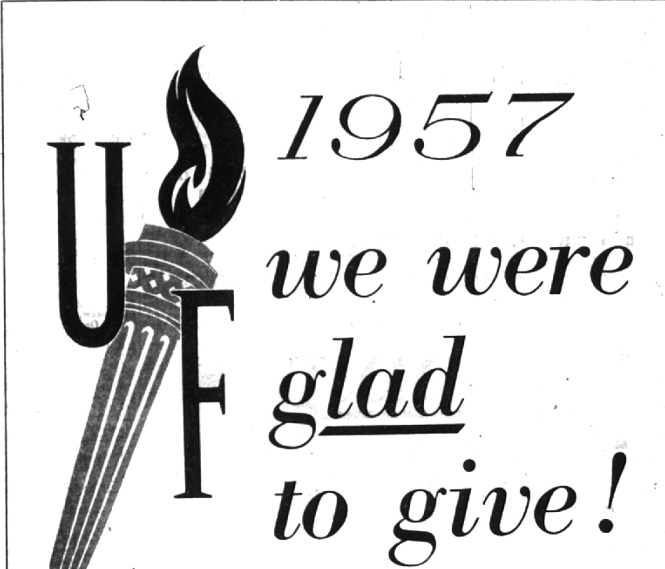
