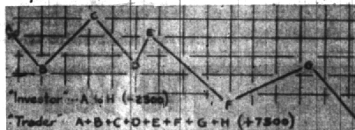


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**Tragedy**

Mallis, who is a powerfully built man and had the advantage of a life jacket, helped to support his companions, first one and then the other, through the dark hours. Dr. Alken was the first to go. Evidently exhausted from his struggle, he died or drowned. Mallis said he tied his body to the boat as best he could.

LATER GARDNER grew somewhat frantic, then quieted, and the next Mallis knew, he was hanging on to another dead man. He tried to tie his body to the boat as well. Mallis had been attempting to get rid of the sail and mast. He had no knife but managed by using his teeth to tear the sail and loosen it from the mast and boom.

After another struggle with the mast he finally managed to get it torn loose and the boat righted itself but was full of water. The mast and rigging still clung to it when Mallis was found.

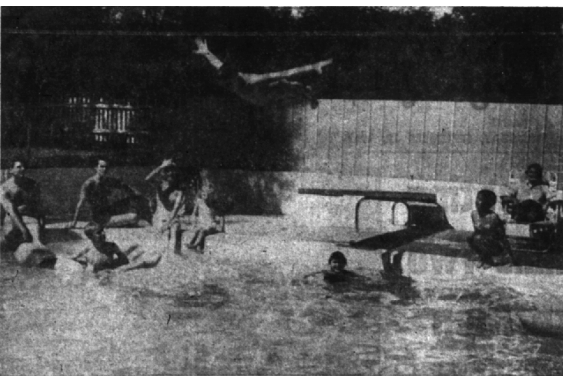
IT WAS IN this wreck that Mallis drifted for four days, 40 miles across Lake Huron to the point opposite Calcie harbor where he was picked up. His body was bleached white from the water in which it was continually drenched and he had no food. Dr. Ries stated to the Advance that Mallis could not have survived more hours in the drifting boat.

Sheriff Leonard Sorgenfrei, in investigating the wreck, found two sleeping bags, a bilfold and other items in the bottom of the boat after it had been lifted to the breakwall at Calcie.

They are being dried out so that further examination can be made.

THE SHERIFF notified Birmingham authorities who in turn notified members of the men's families. Immediately after Mallis had been picked up by the Dolomite, the tug Limestone went out and towed the wreck into the harbor. Company officials of the Limestone division notified the Coast Guard of the rescue.

In the minds of officers investigating the disaster, the 18-foot open boat used by the men was no craft for sailing on the open waters of the big lakes. Even in the more sheltered waters of the Straits it was a precarious undertaking.

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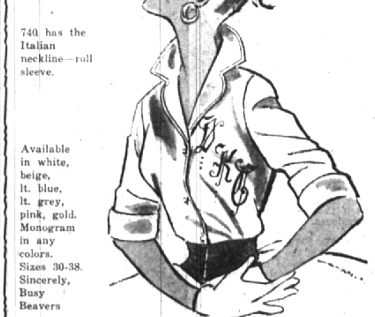
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
