SOUTHFIELD — Township zoning board of appeals granted approval of a Hebrew School and Theological Seminary on property located at 10 1/2 Mile and Fairfax drive at an August meeting.

Board of appeals required that a 15-foot greenbelt surround the property which must have a paved, drained and lighted parking lot. The building itself must be at least 50 feet from the lot line, and the approval is good for a two-year period.

Lathrup's Dutch Elm Program Agenda Outlined

LATHRUP — Robert W. Gilmore, city tree committee chairman, told council last week:
1) The city should encourage re-planting of trees.
2) A city-wide program of tree pruning and sanitation should be developed.
3) That a tree-pruning committee has been secured by the city to prune privately-owned trees at the lowest bidder figure of \$2.88.

OP 50 TREES surveyed by volunteers, five are suspected of having Dutch elm disease and samples have been sent to Lansing for testing.

Gilmore estimated that 122 trees would be removed in 1957, 18 less than the city lost last year. He pointed out that a plateau had been reached in tree loss but unless an effective program was continued the tree losses could be expected to climb.
