## No Objections to 6 Assessment Areas

SOUTHFIELD — No objections were voiced on six special assessment districts Tuesday as township board set bond interest at six per cent and called for payments over a 10-year period.

Cost per front foot for Kentfield water district will be \$5.28, board officials announced. Kentfield sewer front foot costs will be \$7.02 for a combination sewer and Kentfield paving east of Fairfax will be \$7.76 for concrete surface. West of Fairfax the cost will be \$7.77. Beechwood paving, originally estimated at over \$8 per front foot, passed without objection at a cost of \$4.92 per front foot.

This reaffirms a vote taken last year by the 600-home subdivision board on the same question. Reed said.

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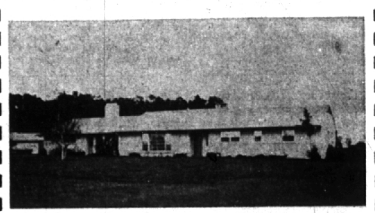

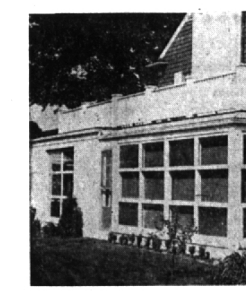
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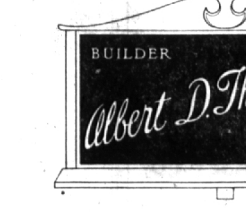
